

Summary of One World Institute Projects to 2014

LOCATION	DATE	DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT
Leyte, Samar, Cebu	2014	Disaster Relief for Typhoon Yolanda , with total number of people fed approximately 90,000 during multiple missions, with large amounts of medicines
Zamboanga City	2014+	Medical Mission, Food, Hygiene Kits for Internally Displaced Muslims made homeless by the September, 2013 fighting in Zamboanga City, serving 130,000 IDPs and ongoing.
Zamboanga City	2014	Census and Demographic Research Project on refugees in Zamboanga City.
Mindoro Orientale	2014	Books and school supplies to remote barangays on multiple missions.
Mindanao	2014	Thousands of school books to Central Mindanao as part of educational program.
Davao	2014	Halfway House support for Mindanao Children Cancer Patients
Mindanao	2014	Micro Finance for Women Survivors of Disasters
Stanford University	2012	At the Hoover Institution, OWI convened a VIP conference titled "Global Hot Spots."
Philippines	2007-2013	20,000 Free Wheelchairs distributed to disabled children and adults, from Ilocos Norte to the entire nation as far as Tawi Tawi, to include widely in Palawan
Cambodia	2008-2013	2,200 Free Wheelchairs distributed to disabled Cambodians
Jolo	2008-2014	Completed municipal new water supply. Conceived, planned, and built a 3 mile pipeline from a volcano to 5 municipalities who had to walk for water for 4 centuries before. Competing warlords had to be convinced to permit the infrastructure project, which was complex. OWI Continues to manage the operations of the cooperative.
Siasi	2013-14+	Established a 35 hectare coconut processing plantation to benefit several hundred impoverished families who had no work
Tawi-Tawi, Sulu	2011-14+	Establishment and management of large seaweed plantation cooperatives of several hundred families on two remote and far-separated islands
Siasi	2011	The "Reading Island", a pilot project wherein OWI established a library for children of seaweed farmers who had no books or pencils as a model that can be replicated widely
Jolo	2008 onward	Movie Nights and after school reading programs . Movies that promote positive feelings toward America are shown to Muslim children. Crowds grew so big that more logs had to be wedged under the movie house foundation.
Manila	2011	Typhoon Ondoy. Caused extensive flooding with pestilence in its wake, so OWI distributed medicines for Leptospirosis after the people had to wade for days through water tainted with dog, rat, and cat urine.
Cagayan de Oro	2012	Typhoon Sendong. Fed thousands of victims in the aftermath
Eastern Mindanao	2012	Typhoon Pablo. Widely believed to represent unfavorable climate change, this typhoon ripped through an area not touched for generations. So many people were crushed under trees that no local equipment could lift. OWI brought relief goods, Hygiene Kits, a Roofing Project.
Visayas	2013-14	Typhoon Yolanda: see above
Mindanao	2000-2014	Kidnap victim rescues. Organized a mass movement, Anti Kidnapping.
La Union	1990s	Organized a facial reconstruction/ plastic surgery team that came from America to operate for no charge. Teams came every year for several years to operate on close to 2,000 indigent patients-- children mostly-- disfigured by cleft lip or palate, without losing a single patient.
Negros	1990s	A continuation of the La Union reconstructive surgery project.
San Francisco, USA	2005-2013	West Bay Filipino Multicultural Center, an after school program for teenagers in a rough part of town. 45 years of success.
Bohol	2013	After a massive earthquake, distributed relief goods and supplied fresh water for drinking.
Ilo Ilo	2013	Relief for devastated area from Typhoon Yolanda. Projects in 8 barangays.
Siquijor	2013	Earthquake relief
Nationwide	2007	Imported and distributed more than 2,000,0000 doses of antibiotics at no cost to patients
Manila/Taguig	2006-2007	First and Second Moro Art Contest, paintings by former commanders who have chosen the peaceful road. In addition to prizes for winners, all participants received excellent art supplies.
Nationwide	2007-2014	Peace Projects. Fundamentally, everything OWI does aims to promote peace on earth, at least relief of suffering. To that end, OWI has programs such as, "Seaweed for Peace," "Pearls for Peace," "Reading for Peace," and "Fishing for Peace."
Nationwide	1990-2014	Tens of thousands of books for libraries in many villages nationwide.
Davao	2000	Convened an Ecological Conference attended by more than 1,000 officials
Ilocos Norte	2007-2014	Medical missions and wheelchair distribution
Nationwide	1990s-2002	Worked with JUSMAG and US Embassy to supply hospital and medical supplies to needy areas
